General Course Information

Description

This is a graduate-level introductory course in information security. It teaches the basic concepts, principles, and fundamental approaches to securing computers and networks. Its main topics include security basics, security management and risk assessment, software security, operating systems security, database security, cryptography algorithms and protocols, network authentication and secure network applications, malware, network threats and defenses, web security, mobile security, legal and ethical issues, and privacy.
