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General Course Information

Description

This course is a synchronous online course designed for learners of Japanese who have completed JAPN 3001 (Advanced Japanese I) or equivalent and wish to strengthen their reading and listening skills to comprehend complex language materials. Emphasis is placed on developing the level of competence equivalent to the Japanese Language Proficiency in reading and listening equivalent to the JLPT N2 and N3 levels as shown by → below. For details about the JLPT levels, please visit the main [JLPT Website](#).

- o N1: Understand Japanese used in a variety of circumstances (Full-time work/Graduate school)
- o → N2: Understand Japanese used in everyday situations, and in a variety of circumstances to a certain degree (College/Vocational school)
- o → N3: Understand Japanese used in everyday situations to a certain degree (Good enough for part-time work)
- o N4: Understand basic Japanese (familiar everyday situations)
- o N5: Understand some basic Japanese (survival level)

Although we will emphasize reading and listening skills, some conversational and writing skills—which cover a wide range of vocabulary and grammatical functions—will also be included.

Students are encouraged (but not required) to take the official JLPT (<https://jlpt.us/>) on the first Sunday of December in the US. Registration opens in August (It may fill up quickly). If you are planning to take it, register for it ASAP.

This course will count toward your major (ALIS, IAML, GEML), minor or certificate. If you have not taken JAPN 2002 at GT or are unsure about your proficiency level, please take our online placement test at <https://gatech.instructure.com/courses/108472> and follow its recommendations. No native or heritage speakers of Japanese are allowed to take this course.

Course Learning Outcomes

1. Learn advanced and complex structural patterns and vocabulary for JLPT N2 and N3
2. Be familiar with the test format of JLPT N2 and N3
3. Review kanji covered through 3001 and more
4. Increase their familiarity with Japanese culture and society
5. Increase the delivery skills in presenting intermediate level Japanese discourse content

Course Policies

Course Modality

This course is designed as an online course. Lectures and class discussions will be recorded, but watching the recorded classes will NOT count as attendance. Students are not allowed to use their computers, cellphones in class unless otherwise requested to do so by the instructor. Failure to comply with this will result in lowering their participation and performance grades. Students are allowed to miss a class without penalty up to two times.
