### **General Course Information**

#### **Description**

KOR 1002 is a beginning Korean II course designed for students who have completed KOR 1001 or demonstrate equivalent proficiency. Students will improve their linguistic skills to become more proficient and fluent in daily and extended communication needs, emphasizing speaking and listening. In addition to an ongoing review of basic grammar and incorporating a greater variety of grammar structures, the course will expose students to enhanced vocabulary and Korean culture.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

*Upon successful completion of this course, student will be able to:*

1. Use Korean to communicate with peers and instructor both orally and in writing to create a shared community experience.
2. Employ strategies to comprehend texts (in written, aural, and video form) written by and for Korean speakers.
3. Employ strategies to express ideas orally and in writing related to familiar topics in presentational contexts.
4. Employ strategies to express ideas in interpersonal contexts in culturally appropriate ways, including identifying and signaling comprehension breakdown, asking and answering questions, and requesting information.
5. Understand and communicate the basics of Korean-speaking cultures, modes of life, and customs.
6. Develop intercultural awareness through the study of the similarities and differences among and the relationships between language and culture systems.

7. Be prepared to continue developing Korean language skills and cultural understanding in KOR 2001.

Course texts, including workbooks and drill classes, will be posted online, and students can access them at any time. Students are expected to complete their homework on time.
