

KOR 2692: Intensive Intermediate Korean 2

Class Schedule

Objectives of the Course

This is one of the three courses offered during the faculty-led summer study abroad program of LBA Korea. KOR 2692 is an intensive intermediate (2nd year) level course of 3 credits offered for the second 4 weeks of the entire 9-weeks program. This course aims to develop all four skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing of Korean by exposing students to varied topics including introducing other people, describing things and people, guessing, suggesting or promising, talking about family and comparing and contrasting, giving advice and excuses, asking for help, talking about trips, giving and gathering information, and talking about experience.

Through the topics and in-class activities students will develop their vocabulary and knowledge on grammar and enhance their communication skills.

At successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Recognize words and expressions regarding limited topics such as introducing oneself, asking how one is doing, school life, using school facilities, a museum, subway etiquette, cooking, table manners, clothes, gifts, weekend plans, guiding to tourist attractions in Seoul, and finding information about travel destinations.
- Present in class for 2-3 minutes with notes on selected topics.
- Produce simple written descriptions and narrations using a variety of words, phrases, sentences that have been practiced or memorized.
- Demonstrate reading proficiency with authentic Korean texts modified for learners.

Vocabulary Tests (28%)

Every other day, when a new unit starts, a vocabulary test on new words and expressions on that unit will be given at the beginning of the class. 14 units will be covered, and each vocabulary test will count 2%. Students are required to study the new words/expressions in advance so that they can understand the class conducted in Korea better and engage in more activities during the class.

Workbook Assignments (28%)

When each unit is completed, students are expected to submit workbook homework of the completed unit. Each workbook homework counts 4%. (7 workbook assignments x 4 points = 28%)

Midterm: Individual Presentation (20%)

Each student will pick a topic from class and will present on the topic for 3 minutes in Korean.

Students can prepare notes and can refer to the notes during their presentation but are not allowed to read the entire material they prepared.

Final Project: Team Presentation (24%)

Students will form a team of 3 to 4 people and are going to pick one topic covered in class and create presentation material in any format (PPT files, video clips, voice-over/recording, etc.) reflecting their understanding of the situations or topics. The topics include introducing oneself, asking how one is doing, school life, using school facilities, a museum, subway etiquette, cooking, table manners, clothes, gifts, weekend plans, guiding to tourist attractions in Seoul, and finding information about travel destinations.

[Project Evaluation Criteria]

Presentation Length: about 5 minutes

Accuracy of the script: 12% (Each team is required to submit the skit before the presentation or recording of their skit so that the instructor can give feedback)

Grammar points used: 6% (The script MUST use 15+ grammar points covered in class)

Accurate pronunciation and intonation: 6%

Attendance and late work

Students are expected to come to all class meetings in time. Any tardiness will not be accepted.
