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Course Description

This course provides an overview of the ethical, professional, and regulatory principles that guide responsible research in the behavioral sciences. Students will examine policies, practices, and real-world cases relevant to conducting, reporting, and evaluating research.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Explain core principles of responsible conduct of research in behavioral science
 - Identify federal, institutional, and disciplinary policies governing research with human and animal subjects
 - Evaluate ethical issues in research design, data collection, and data management
 - Apply best practices for data sharing, ownership, and reproducibility
 - Describe the peer review process and its role in scientific integrity
 - Determine appropriate criteria for authorship and publication credit
 - Analyze responsibilities in mentor–mentee relationships and collaborative research
 - Identify and evaluate conflicts of interest and their impact on research integrity
 - Recognize forms of research misconduct and appropriate institutional responses
 - Assess the broader societal, environmental, and ethical implications of scientific research
