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This is a Core IMPACTS course that is part of the Humanities area.

Course Description

LMC 3234 Creative Writing is focused entirely on making poems. The class will focus on the study of essential elements of poetic craft; literary devices, and close readings of representative poems in order to produce your own poems with an eye toward workshopping your original work in class.

This course is also intended to give you practice in various styles of poetry writing, points of view, as well as forms and various performance aspects of poetry. You will gain an understanding of the "creative impulse—why we write. What compels us to do so? You will also learn to be a better editor of your own work, as well as the work of others.

Learning Outcomes

* Interpretive Frameworks: Students will become familiar with a variety of social, political, and philosophical theories and be able to apply those theories to creative and scientific texts, as well as to their own cultural observations.

* Literary/Film/Narrative Art Inquiry: Students will be aware of the traditions and conventions of literature, film, and other forms of narrative art, and they will be able to analyze those traditions and conventions in specific cultural contexts.

*Students will devote an entire semester to the reading and study of poetry and become conversant with issues of technique as well as literary devices and poetic forms.

*Students will understand the defining characteristics of the specific genre studied and what sets it apart from other writing genres and art forms.

Attendance

In order to succeed as a writer, or in any other field of study for that matter, you must be dedicated and disciplined. A major indicator of those two traits is regular attendance. Therefore, you are expected to be in class. More than three absences may result in a standard letter grade deduction.

Class Participation

Being present in body is important, but being present in mind is equally as important. That is why you must add to class discussions and comment on your colleagues' work as necessary. To earn all points for class participation you must have read all assigned materials as well as have read your colleagues' poems for workshop and have prepared your comments in advance.

Assignments

Your talent as a writer or your level of creativity will not be graded. However, your time put into assignments, your level of engagement, your completion and accuracy of assignments, as well as mastery of the material will be graded.

Writing Journal

750 words per week—your ongoing assignment. Your journal may include a discussion of what you're reading in class (reaction to the poems), where you're traveling, ideas for poems, things you see as you move about the world each day, drafts of new poems, things you heard on the train or street, notes on articles you've read during the week which inspire you in some way, and more.

Motion Poems

We'll divide into groups, and each group will make a short film that is a visual interpretation of a single poem.
